Numbers 1 to 10

- Read numbers from 1 to 10

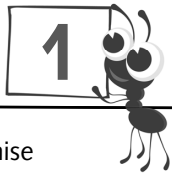
You will need:

- glue
- scissors
- colour pencils/crayons/
felt-tipped pens

Your child has been learning to recognise numbers. Although they may be familiar with counting and number names, sometimes children may find it difficult to recognise a number when it is written down.

If they are having difficulty in remembering the formation of the written numbers, write them out in sequence. Write out the numbers 1 to 10 on a strip of paper and then say: **Point to 4. Point to 6.** Or ask: **Can you see 3? Which number is 2?** If they still have difficulty in recognising particular numbers, provide them with clues, for example: **It is after 4 but before 6. It is two jumps away from 7.** Increase their confidence by praising them, and continue to encourage their efforts throughout the activity.

What to do



This sheet helps your child to recognise numbers from 1 to 10.

First help your child to cut out the numbers from the bottom of Homework N3.

Ask them to count from 1 to 10 with you, and ask them to arrange the numbers in the same order in the empty row below the pictures. Help them to glue these into place once they are correct.

Then ask your child to look at each number in turn, and colour that number of objects in the column above it, e.g. above '3' they colour three elephants of the six that are shown.

What to do



Look for numbers in everyday situations, e.g. on food packaging, houses, buses, cars and so on. Ask your child if they can see any numbers that they recognise, even if these are individual digits within larger numbers, e.g. they recognise the '5' in '975'.
